Why This Project Matters to Me

This booklet brings together a series of posters I've created to highlight core ethical values that I believe are vital in today's world. While each topic addresses a different aspect of character and behavior, they all reflect a common principle: how we treat others and engage with our communities shapes the kind of environment we live in.

The motivation behind this project came from observing everyday situations — in school settings, online spaces, and broader social dynamics — where fairness, respect, and empathy are often challenged. These posters were a way for me to start conversations, raise awareness, and encourage thoughtful reflection among peers.

By turning these designs into a booklet, I wanted to go beyond visual messaging and explore the real-world relevance of each topic. My goal is to remind readers that ethical behavior isn't abstract. It plays out in how we speak, act, and make decisions — often in ways that influence others more than we realize. If this booklet encourages even small moments of reflection, then it's served its purpose.

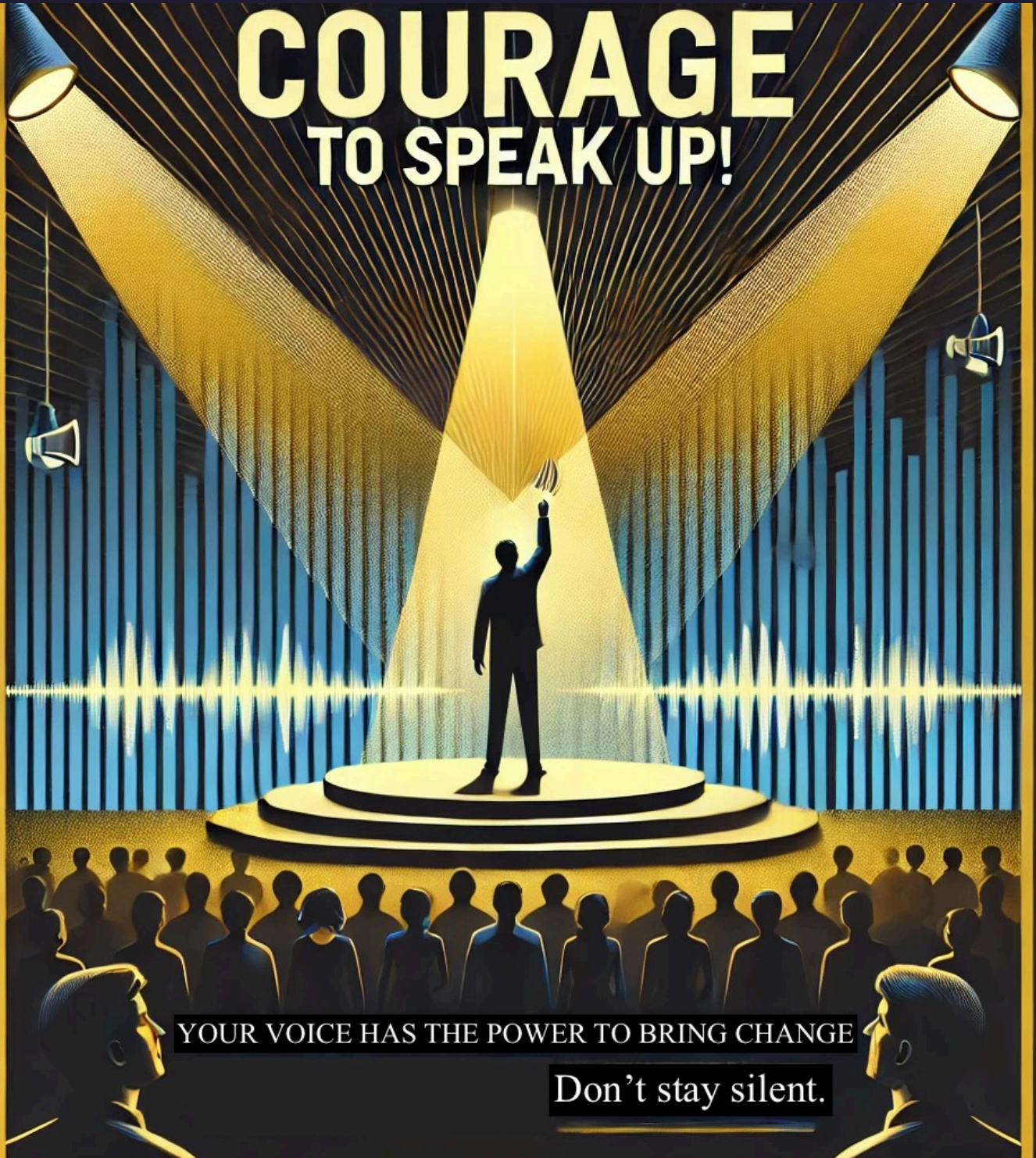

WHAT IS ETHICAL CONSUMPTION?

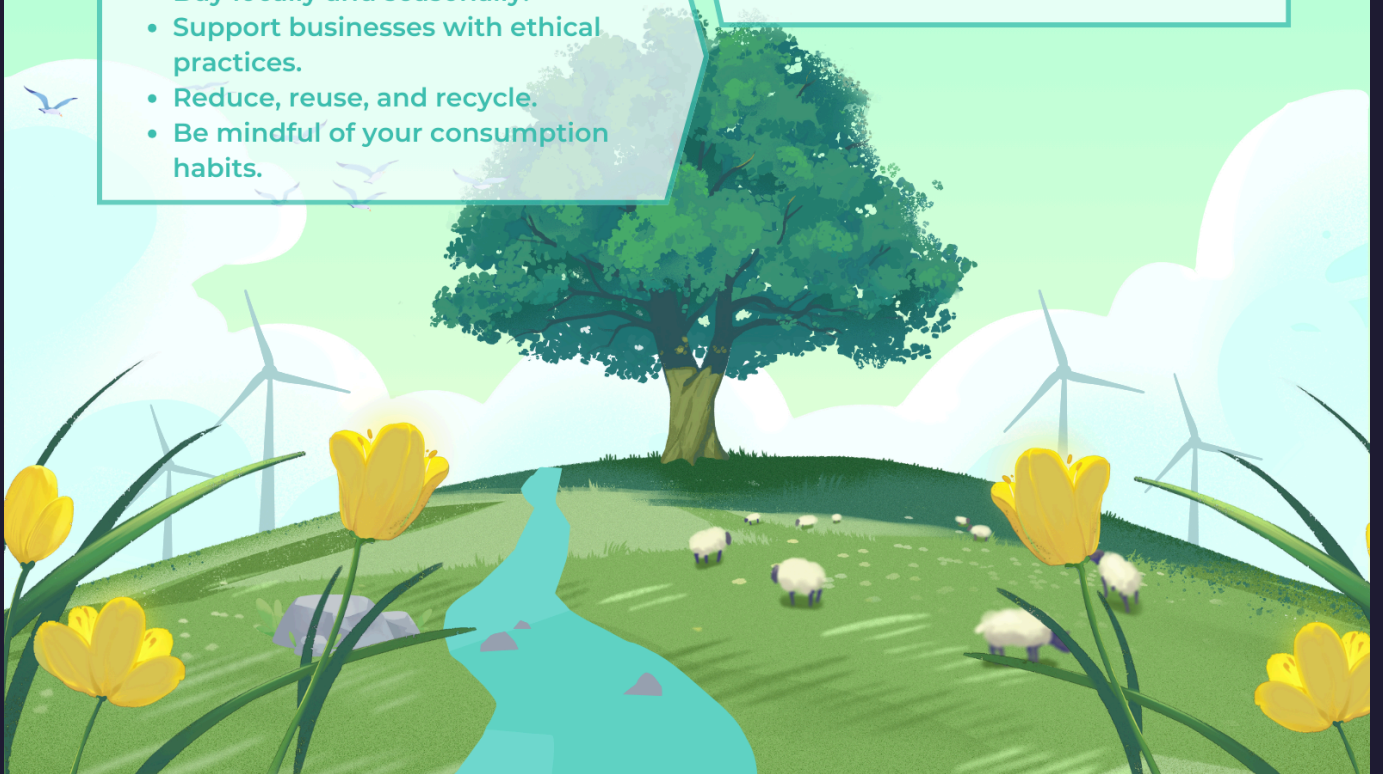
Choosing products and services that are produced and sourced in a way that minimizes harm to people, animals, and the environment.
